Elevating Transfer: The Florida Consortium Transfer Success Network

This session will be a panel discussion focused on how three metropolitan universities have taken a network improvement approach to elevating transfer success at FIU, UCF, and USF. As policy and assessment standards change in the State of Florida along with a renewed emphasis on ontime graduation data, the panelists will discuss how they are working together with their partner state colleges to use data and process to shorten time to degree.

This presentation will include an overview of the services provided by the Florida Virtual Campus (FLVC), to provide students with comprehensive educational planning tools for admissions, advising, and transfer. This demo will also showcase FLVC's repository of information for online courses, programs and institutions across the state.

FLVC is a statewide hub for delivering innovative educational services that operate collaboratively across Florida's public education institutions and educational systems. Working collaboratively with Florida's 12 public universities, 28 public colleges, 67 K-12 school districts, and other workforce partners, FLVC provides state-funded services to help students go to college, succeed in school, prepare for career success, and thrive in life after graduation.

Session - 3

Tracking and Supporting Students in A.A. Programs

Presenter: Rob Johnstone, Founder & President, National Center for Inquiry & Improvement

Colleges in Florida and across the country have large numbers of students in "general" A.A. programs; historically research has told us that these students are at the highest risk for (a) not making progress toward their goals, and (b) transferring without junior standing in a given major. While Florida colleges have some advantages due to the statewide articulation agreement, both of these remain persistent problems at many schools. In this session we will (a) explore the challenges that general A.A. students face, (b) explore data points that can be used to track such students; and (c) strategize approaches under a guided pathways framework that would accelerate student progress and increase equitable goal attainment.

Session - 4

Cultivating Faculty Leadership for Student Success

Faculty play a critical and often under-recognized role in the success of students on campuses. Student success reforms done well engage faculty as leaders in supporting students both in and out of the classroom. In this concurrent session, Achieving the Dream will share lessons learned from colleges engaged in reforms focused on the alignment of holistic student supports and teaching and learning. Participants will explore practical strategies for cultivating faculty leadership and building collaborative partnerships between faculty and student affairs professionals. This session will also include the tools your team needs to plan a successful guided pathways transformation with faculty leading the way.

It is rare for community colleges to examine enrollment in their programs through an equity lens. Most often, program enrollment is only looked at through traditional retention and completion metrics at the aggregate level. In order to make advances toward equitable outcomes for all students, institutions must have a clear understanding of their enrollment at the programmatic level – e.g. which students are enrolled in which programs? Even more importantly, are low-income students and students of color at the institution enrolled in programs that lead to low-wage positions in the marketplace? Once colleges have this data, what are the next steps?

Community colleges with excellent labor market outcomes adapt to deliver what employers need and ensure all students graduate with the skills and credentials needed for success in the labor market. This work necessitates developing responsive and mutually beneficial employer partnerships. Through research with dozens of high-performing community colleges, the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program (CEP) explored the practices, processes, and mindsets that lead to effective workforce programs, including developing and maintaining strong partnerships, in *The Workforce Playbook*. The *Playbook* is a practical guide to setting a vision for talent development and economic mobility and implementing practices that balance the needs of students and employers to advance the overall prosperity of their regions. This session will feature effective practices and case studies of community college—employer partnerships and help participants explore strategies to develop these relationships in a variety of geographic and economic contexts.



Michael A. Baston, Ed.D.

President, Rockland Community College

Dr. Michael A. Baston is the 7th President of Rockland Community College. A national leader who helps develop comprehensive supports that foster college completion, Dr. Baston's work has been featured on MSNBC, and in The Chronicle of Higher Education, The Atlantic, The Community College Times, and Black Enterprise Magazine. Additionally, he is a contributing author to Race, Education, and Reintegrating Formerly Incarcerated Citizens and The Handbook for Student Affairs in Community Colleges.

Dr. Baston was a member of the inaugural class of Aspen Institute Presidential Fellows for Community College Excellence where he explored systemic issues affecting the educational access pipeline and student success. As a national Guided Pathways coach for American Association of Community Colleges, he is noted for his work with college leadership teams around the nation, helping them integrate student success initiatives to advance college completion. Dr. Baston is the incoming Co-Chair of Jobs For The Future's Policy Leadership Trust, a Commissioner of American Association of Community College's Commission on Institutional Infrastructure and Transformation and a member of the National Advisory Board of Center for Community College Student Engagement.

Dr. Baston began his career as a public interest lawyer representing various educational institutions and social justice organizations. His work with academic clients led him to pursue a second career in academia as both a professor of legal studies and business and a student affairs administrator. Dr. Baston holds a BA from Iona College, a JD from Brooklyn Law School, and an Ed.D. from St. John Fisher College.



Jennifer Bravo, Ed.D.

Director of Transfer and Transition Services, Florida International University

Dr. Jennifer Bravo is the Director of Transfer and Transition Services (TTS) at Florida International University. She has over 23 years of higher education experience at both the public state college and university systems in Florida. She has professional experience in the areas of Student Recruitment, Admissions, Enrollment Management, Grant Management, Academic Advisement and was the founding Director of The Honors College Dual Language program at Miami Dade College. In her role as Director of Transfer and Transition

Vice President, Diversity, Equity and Student Success, Association of American Colleges and Universities

Dr. Tia Brown McNair is the Vice President in the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Student Success and Executive Director for the Truth, Racial Healing, and Transformation (TRHT) Campus Centers at the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AAC&U) in Washington, DC. She oversees both funded projects and AAC&U's continuing programs on equity, inclusive excellence, high-impact practices, and student success. McNair directs AAC&U's Summer Institutes on High-

Impact Practices and Student Success, and TRHT Campus Centers and serves as the project director for several AAC&U initiatives. She is the lead author of *From Equity Talk to Equity Walk: Expanding Practitioner Knowledge for Racial Justice in Higher Education* (January 2020) and *Becoming a Student-Ready College: A New Culture of Leadership for Student Success* (July 2016). In March 2020, Diverse: Issues In Higher Education named McNair one of thirty-five outstanding women who have tackled some of higher education's toughest challenges and made a positive difference in their communities.

Ms. Dennard led the development of Florida's unified plan for implementing the WorkforceInnovation

and Opportunity Act, the federal legislation that modernizes states workforce systems through a market-driven approach to better serve businesses, workers and job seekers.

A 2019 recipient of Development Counsellors International's prestigious 40 Under 40 Award in economic development, and the Florida Economic Development Council's 2019 Toni Jennings Workforce Professional of the Year, Ms. Dennard is a member of the Florida Chamber Foundation Board of Trustees, the Florida Small Business Development Center Network State Advisory Board, the Florida Talent Development Council and an inaugural member of the Florida Student Success Center's Advisory Board.



Laurie Fladd, Ph.D.

Director of Holistic Student Supports, Achieving the Dream

In this role, Laurie is responsible for the strategic leadership and implementation of ATD's coaching services related to holistic student supports, advising redesign, and transformative institutional change. This role also involves assisting colleges in improving the student experience through the intentional development of scalable comprehensive support services.

Prior to working at ATD, Laurie has spent her career as a practitioner in the community college serving in Science and Mathematics as an adjunct instructor, full time instructor, Department Head, and

Associate Dean. She was recognized as the Manager/Educator of the Year for the South Carolina Technical Education Association in 2016. Most recently, she has served Trident Technical College as the Director of Academic Advising and the project director of the iPASS grant. As project director Laurie and her team worked across academic affairs and student services to transform the student onboarding and advising experience. Her dissertation examined distance learning in a community college setting and how student satisfaction varies with interaction. Kathy Hebda has committed more than 30 years to improving education for students in Florida across all educational sectors. Together with Thomas Bailey and Shanna Jaggars, he co-authored *Redesigning America's Community Colleges: A Clearer Path to Student Success* (Harvard University Press, 2015), which has helped to catalyze a

national "guided pathways" whole-college reform movement. For the past five years, Jenkins has led research involving over 100 colleges nationally on the implementation of pathways reforms and their effects on student outcomes, equity and college performance. More recently, Jenkins and his team are studying the efforts of colleges that were early adopters of guided pathways to partner with employers, universities, and K-12 schools in creating cross-sectoral education pathways designed to advance economic mobility and workforce development in their communities. Jenkins earned a Ph.D. in public policy analysis from Carnegie Mellon University and a bachelor's in religion from Princeton University.



Adrienne Johnston

Ms. Adrienne Johnston was appointed Director of the Department of Economic Opportunity's Division of Workforce Services in November 2020. Dr. Rob Johnstone is a national leader in the higher education reform movement and is the Founder & President of the National Center for Inquiry & Improvement (NCII). He created NCII in 2013 to help 2-year and 4-year colleges create structures, processes and cultures that increase student completion, learning and labor market outcomes. His unique & engaging approach to inquiry & improvement fuses the world of foundations, initiatives, and system-level policy changes with the ground-level work of college practitioners and senior college leaders.
