

Why Implement Guided Pathways?

Too many students wander because they are:

- Undecided in regard to career goals
- Unaware of the elements of a chosen career
- Disconnected regarding the initial curriculum and their career choice





Initial Contributing Factors

- Avg. # of credits completed for AA degree = <u>81 hrs</u>
- Avg. # of credits completed for AS degree = <u>93 hrs</u>
- University Excess Hours Fees 100% Increase over 110% credit hours
- New Financial Aid language
- 2,500 Students Enrolled in Fall
 2015 and did not return Spring
 2016 (Good Academic Standing)




Focus on completion, while maintaining access.




4 Dimensions of Guided Pathways



- ✓ Goal: Build a relationship with student

Advising Data

- 2,423 FTIC Students in Fall 2020 (as of 8/28/2020)
- ✓ **35,526** Students Interactions from July 1-August 17, 2020
- ✓ 80% Fall 2020 FTIC had an Interaction with an Advisor between July 1-August 17, 2020

The Career Conversation

Student Confidence Level: Student is <u>uncertain</u> about community and <u>uncertain</u> about program.

<u>Characteristics</u>

- No understanding of program or options available to them (AA vs. AS)
- \checkmark Uninterested
- ✓ Distressed about making a decision
- \checkmark Afraid of committing
- ✓ Answers are "I don't know"

Student Confidence Level: Student is <u>uncertain</u> about community and <u>uncertain</u> about program.

<u>Characteristics</u>

- Potentially deciding between multiple programs.
- Might know what they want to do but not how to get there.
- Curious and have a lot of questions.
- ✓ Exploratory and eager to learn about different paths.
- Looking at several AA transfer options, and transfer institution not identified.

Student is <u>certain</u> about community and <u>certain</u> about program

<u>Characteristics</u>


- Confident in program choice and know steps to take to complete program.
- ✓ Understand difference between AA and AS degree.
- ✓ AS understand job market for selected program.
- ✓ AA students identified transfer college/university




